

# ELETA and the Revision of the TAF TSI

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# The Four Forces of Rail and ETA



For Estimated Time of Arrival (ETA) the quality and data for the algorithms has historically been poor

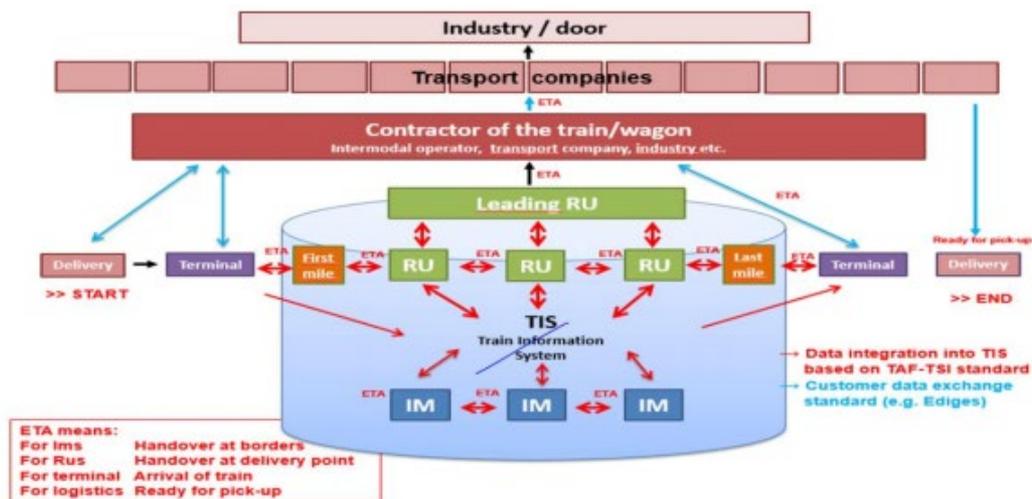
Most forecast messages are based on time-shifting

Only a few infrastructure managers take into account the ETA of their neighbouring counterparts

More than 25 % of trains are not linked with a unique reference number connecting different train numbers to one train

- The TAF TSI describes business processes involving Infrastructure Managers (IMs), Railway Undertakings (RUs), and other stakeholders, and defines the **data exchange** between individual IMs and also between IMs and Rus
- The next revision of TAF TSI will be discussed in RISC in 2020, in order to be published in 2021
- The ELETA project has done a great job in order to deliver valuable input to the TAF TSI revision
- ETA computing and quality must be still validated over a longer time period (in-the-field test series)
  - Therefore, ETA computing and quality will, for the time being, be included only into the Rail Sector's TAF Handbook
  - **As soon as ETA computing and quality will be more stable then it *will be* incorporated into the TAF revision (Open Point)**

- CT's proprietary *EDIGES messages* have been successfully mapped by ERA, UIRR and RNE against the Official TAF TSI messages
- CT actors have *been incorporated* into the revised TAF TSI
- CT actors can get all transport related messages directly from their business partners without being in the obligation to get them from the Lead RU
- ToDo
  - CT actors, CT terminals, and CT Train Identifiers must get unique identification codes to be able to participate in the message exchange with the existing TAF TSI community
  - Existing TAF TSI ETA messages must be adapted (via ERA's CCM process) to be able to accommodate enhanced ETA





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
